2. Reporting Sports Premium Grant

2.1. Department for Education

School compliance

You are accountable for how you use of the PE and sport premium funding allocated to you. You are expected to spend the grant for the purpose it was provided – to make additional and sustainable improvements to the PE, sport and physical activity offered. Schools and local authorities must follow the terms and conditions in the <u>conditions of grant documents</u>.

- how the improvements will be sustainable in the future

You are also required to publish the percentage of pupils within your year 6 cohort in the 2022 to 2023 academic year who met the national curriculum requirement to:

- swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- use a range of strokes effectively, for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke
- perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations

Attainment data for year 6 pupils should be provided from their most recent swimming lessons. This may be data from years 3, 4, 5 or 6, depending on the swimming programme at your school. It is essential to retain attainment data from swimming lessons in years 3 to 5 to be able to report this accurately in year 6.

2.2. Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of the PE Leader, overseen by the Senior Leadership Team,

to utilise this grant in the most effective way to enable the greatest possible participation in physical activity for all pupils including specific groups who may be at risk of lower participation e.g. Ever 6 pupils and girls.


Chesswood Junior spends much more than the SPG on PE with over £55 000 spent on PE and school sports provision with a dedicated PE department (PE Specialist Teacher and Sports Coach) as well as TA and Learning Mentors who run active programmes at break and lunchtimes.

3.2. Expenditure:

Key Expenditure:

- Specialist PE Teachers to facilitate extra-curricular activities and sports competitions – £10 000
- Sports Coach facilitate organised lunchtime sport £1500
- Dedicated TAs for organised playtime £1500
- Sports Coach Extra-curricular Clubs £3000
- Membership to Worthing School Sports Association £1800

The actual expenditure for Physical Education and School Sport is far greater than the Sports Premium grant because of the specialist PE teaching budget.
