To refer to people or animals: who, whom, whose

To refer to objects or animals: that, which

To refer to time or place: when, where

Expanded Noun Phrase

An expanded noun phrase is a phrase made up of **a noun** and **at least one adjective**.

If you list more than one adjective to describe the noun, you should add a **comma** to separate them.

lots of yummy, cold ice cream

Determiner

Used to introduce a noun to specify which one or how many; a/an, the, three, most.

Adjective

A word that describes a noun; monstrous, vivid, delightful, familiar.

Noun

A person, object or animal; garage, Henry, leopard, sofa.

Using Brackets for Parenthesis

The Narcissus (daffodil) is a spring plant with yellow petals.

Parenthesis: extra information or an afterthought in our writing. This could be a word, phrase or sentence. If you took, the parenthesis away, our writing would still be complete.

Only put brackets around the actual parenthesis.

My brother (the one who lives in Australia)

is coming to visit.

I want to be a camera operator when I grow up.

(It looks exciting.)





Inverted Commas

New Speaker, New Line

someone new speaks.

Start a new line whenever

"How are you doing today?"

"I'm great!" said Ashton.

Beginning and End

Keep your inverted commas at the beginning and the end of the words being spoken. "Stop!" I said.

Remember to add commas.

asked Henry.

Punctuation Make sure your speech is correctly punctuated!

Capital Letter

he announced.

Begin what is spoken

with a capital letter!

"What an amazing day!"


"There are times, I feel, that you are a little cold," I said.

Ashton whispered, "Be quiet!" "Goodbye," said Jules.


Past Continuous

Past Continuous is also known as Past Progressive and describes events which happened in the past, over a period of time.



Simple Past

Simple Past is also known as Past Simple and describes events which happened at a specific time, but are now completed.
