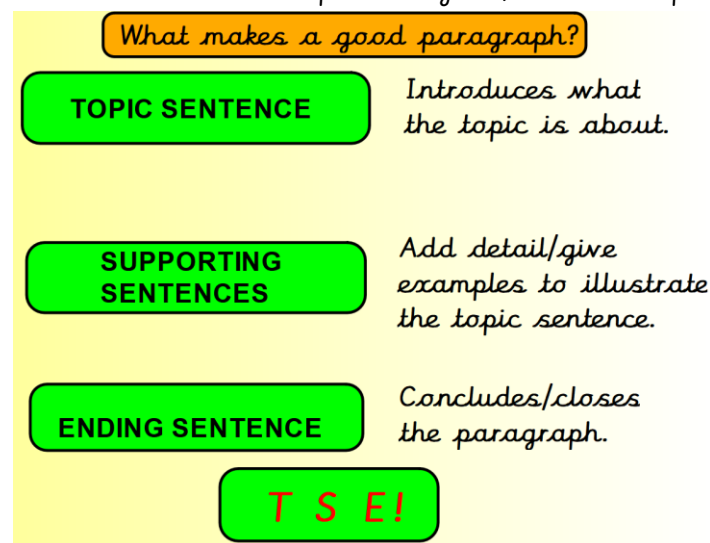
Monday 8th February 2021

WALT: plan by organising information

Before you start this piece of work, please make sure you have completed Task 1 from Guided Reading, which is researching information about your chosen topic. You'll need your research next to you for this lesson.

Task 1 - Nasty Writing

Since we'll be using TSE to write our reports again, let's recap what it is!



This introduction has been all scrambled up! Rewrite the sentences in your home learning journal so that the topic sentence, supporting sentences and ending sentence is in the right order.

Keep reading to find out how to look after these fabulous felines. Cats are cute, cuddly creatures with many different personalities. Although they've made a name for themselves as independent pets who go their own way, they need more care and attention than you might think.

How did you do? This is the order the sentences should be in!

1. Cats are cute, cuddly creatures with many different personalities. - *Topic sentence - this tells the reader that the report is going to be about cats.*
2. Although they've made a name for themselves as independent pets who go their own way, they need more care and attention than you might think. - *Supporting sentence - this links to the previous sentence, giving more information about cats.*
3. Keep reading to find out how to look after these fabulous felines. - *Ending sentence - this tells the reader that the rest of the report will be about looking after cats.*

Task 2 - Write a plan for your report

Next, you are going to write your plan for your report, just like you did for your report on Viking warriors. You will need the information that you gathered in Guided Reading and the plan template on the next page.

Let's have a look at how to turn our notes into a useful plan - I'll show you how to do this for the introduction, like I did before. I've chosen to write about the Sims 4. I need to use the 'general information' section of my notes for this:

General Information about the Sims 4
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Life simulation computer game• Single player• Suitable for age 12 and over• 10 different expansion packs• Create a Sim character - looks, personality, ambitions• Build and furnish houses• Explore different worlds

First, I need to reread my notes and think of a heading for my report. I want something that will make people want to read my report.

Heading: Create Life with the Sims 4

Next, I need to decide what my **topic sentence** will be about. It needs to introduce what my report is about. I'm going to use a bullet point to make a note of that under the 'T' in my plan.

After that, I need to decide what notes I'm going to use for my **supporting sentences**. These need to explain my topic sentence more. I need 1 - 4 bullet points. I'm going to make a note of them under the 'S' in my plan.

Then, I need to make a note of what my **ending sentence** will be. It needs to sum up what I've already written or give the reader a hint as to what's coming next. I'm going to make a note of it under the 'E' in my plan.

Tuesday 9th February 2021

WALT: write by organising paragraphs around a theme

Today, you're going to write and edit the introduction to your report on your chosen topic. Here is our success criteria:

Heading and subheadings	
TSE paragraph structure	
Informal vocabulary	
Topic specific vocabulary	
Co-ordinating and subordinating conjunctions	
Possessive apostrophes	
Pronouns to avoid repetition	
Consistent use of the past or present tense	

Notice how it's almost the same as the success criteria for your Viking warrior reports? The first difference is that 'Viking vocabulary' has become 'topic specific vocabulary' since we're not writing about the Vikings anymore. For me, this will be vocabulary relating specifically to the Sims 4 (like 'Create a Sim', 'Build Mode', 'Simoleons'), since that's what I'm writing about.

The second difference is that it now says 'consistent use of the past or present tense' instead of past tense, as you won't necessarily be writing about something that happened in the past. 'Consistent use of' means you need to pick a tense and stick to it. I'll be writing in the present tense because people still play the Sims 4 today.

Task 1 - Nasty Writing

Let's recap the different types of tenses we have learnt so far!

	Present	Past
Simple	Shows that the verb (action) happens regularly. I work in London. She wears dresses.	Shows that the verb (action) was completed, often (but not always!) using -ed . I worked in London. She wore a dress.
Progressive	Shows that the verb (action) is ongoing, using is/am/are and -ing . I am working in London. She is wearing a dress.	Shows that the verb (action) was ongoing, using was/were and -ing . I was working in London. She was wearing a dress.
Perfect	Shows that it started in the past but is still relevant to the present, using 'have'/'has' . I have worked in London before. She has already worn a dress this week.	Shows that it happened up until a certain point in the past, using 'had' . I had worked in London until last week. She had worn a dress to the prom.

Create Life with the Sims 4

The Sims 4 is a single player, life simulation computer game that allows you to play God! In the game, you can create a Sim character, choosing their looks, personality, and their ambition in life. Will they be a doctor or a villain? The choice is yours! You can also build and furnish houses in a variety of different worlds, from the desert to the mountains of Japan. Read on to discover how you can create life!

Notice how the main bulk of my paragraph is taken from my plan? I've just added in some informal, chatty language and more detail. Remember that an introduction doesn't go into anything too specific, it's just gives the reader a general idea of what the report is about.

Task 1 - Nasty Writing

Possessive apostrophes are part of your success criteria again this week, so let's recap what they are!

Rules for Possessive Apostrophes

- If the root word doesn't end in an 's', then you need to add an apostrophe and an 's'. This is often the case with singular nouns (one thing).
Example: Freya's brother
- If the root word already ends in an 's', then you just need to add an apostrophe on the end. This is often the case with plural nouns (more than one thing).
Example: The Vikings' longships

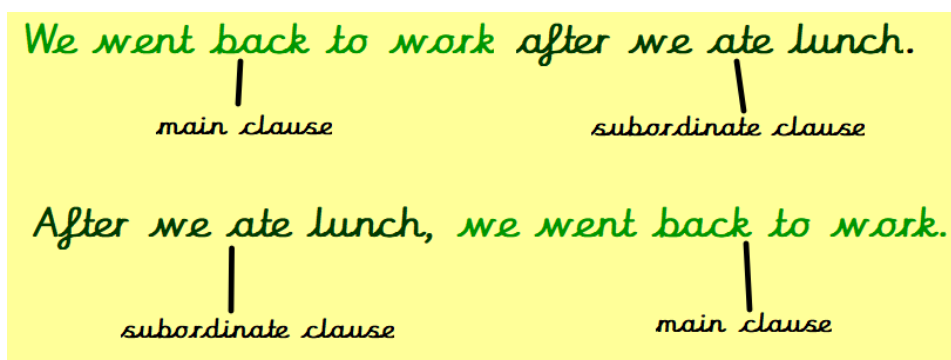
Task 1 - Nasty Writing

Co-ordinating conjunctions join two main clauses together (clauses that CAN stand alone as sentences).

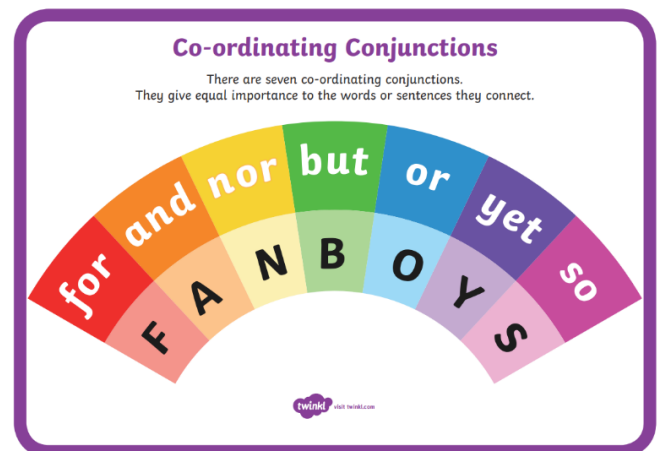

Subordinating conjunctions join main clauses to subordinate clauses (clauses that CAN'T stand alone as a sentence).



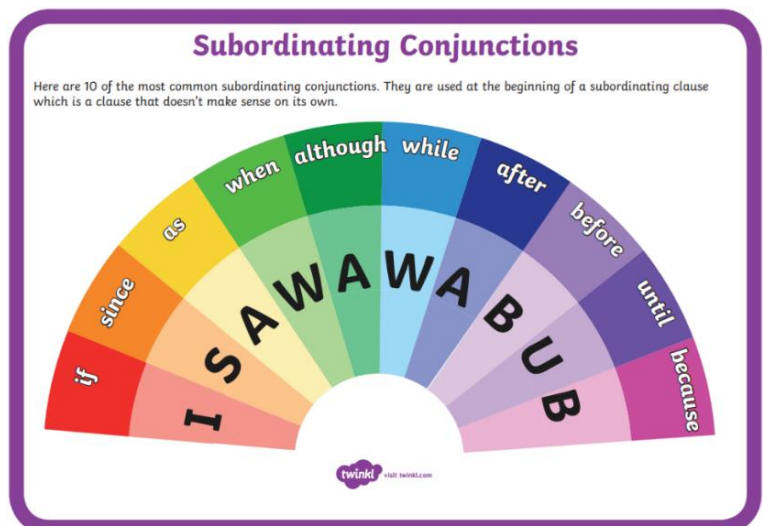

Conjunctions

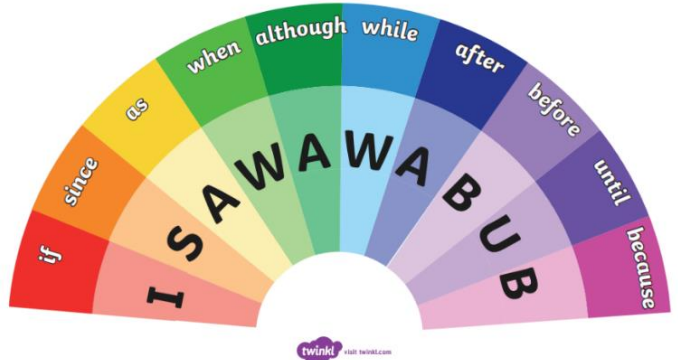
Co-ordinating Conjunctions

There are seven co-ordinating conjunctions. They give equal importance to the words or sentences they connect.



Subordinating Conjunctions

Here are 10 of the most common subordinating conjunctions. They are used at the beginning of a subordinating clause which is a clause that doesn't make sense on its own.



Possessive apostrophes

Apostrophes that show who something belongs to.

- Example: Freya's brother
- Example: The Vikings' longships

Pronouns to avoid repetition

Instead of writing something like this:

The Vikings came from Scandinavia and the Vikings invaded many countries around Europe.

You replace the repeated noun with a pronoun:

The Vikings came from Scandinavia and they invaded many countries around Europe.
