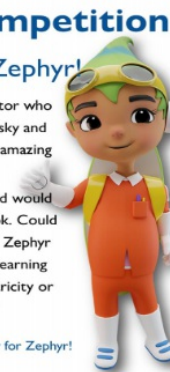
Story Competition!

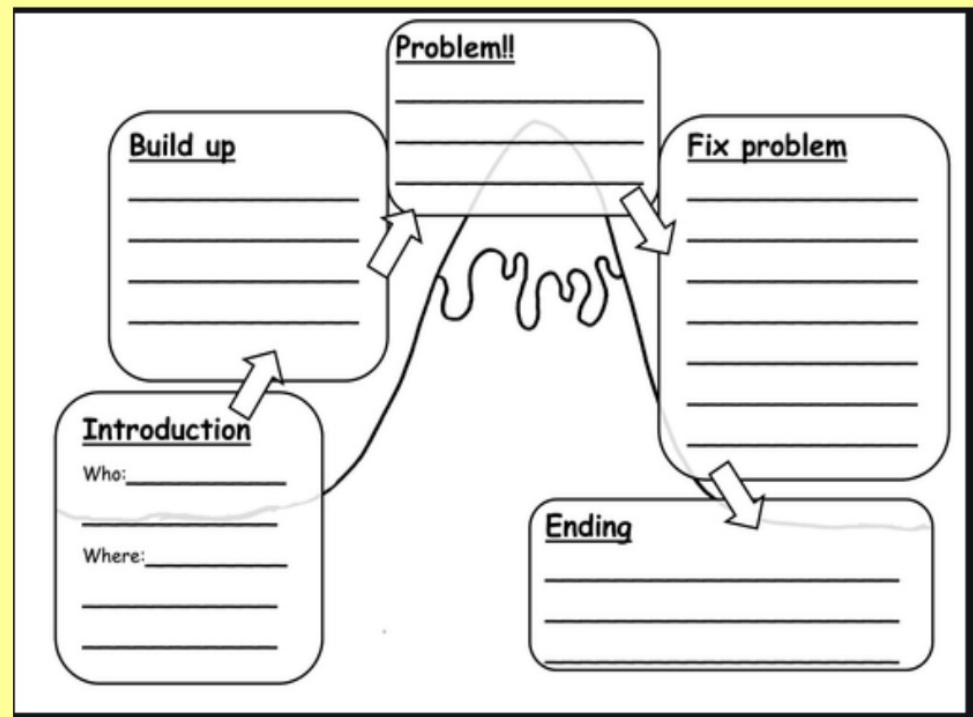

Structure		Introduction - introduce Zephyr, any other characters and the setting.	
		Build up - what is Zephyr doing at the beginning of the story?	
		Problem - Is your story about climate change, wind power, electricity or windy weather? Your problem will be linked to this.	
		Fix problem - will Zephyr come to the rescue with their inventions?	
		Ending - the problem has been fixed. Has anything changed? Has anyone learnt anything?

We must remember to use speech, and ensure that our story includes one of the following topics throughout:

- Electricity
- Windy Weather
- Wind Power
- Climate Change

Using Brackets for Parenthesis

The Narcissus (daffodil) is a spring plant with yellow petals.

Parenthesis: extra information or an afterthought in our writing. This could be a word, phrase or sentence. If you took the parenthesis away, our writing would still be complete.

Only put brackets around the actual parenthesis.

My brother (the one who lives in Australia) is coming to visit.

I want to be a camera operator when I grow up. (It looks exciting.)

Past Continuous

Past Continuous is also known as Past Progressive and describes events which happened in the past, over a period of time.

I was baking

we were baking

they were baking

you were baking (plural)

you were baking (singular)

he/she/it was baking

Simple Past

Simple Past is also known as Past Simple and describes events which happened at a specific time, but are now completed.

I baked

we baked

you baked (singular)

you baked (plural)

they baked

he/she/it baked



Expanded Noun Phrase

An expanded noun phrase is a phrase made up of a noun and at least one adjective. you list more than one adjective to describe the noun, you should add a comma to separate them.

lots of yummy, cold ice cream

Determiner
used to introduce a noun to specify which one or how many: a/an, the, three, most.

Adjective
A word that describes a noun; monstrous, vivid, delightful, familiar.

Noun
A person, object or animal; garage, Henry, leopard, sofa.



Relative pronouns

To refer to people or animals: *who, whom, whose*

To refer to objects or animals: *that, which*

To refer to time or place: *when, where*

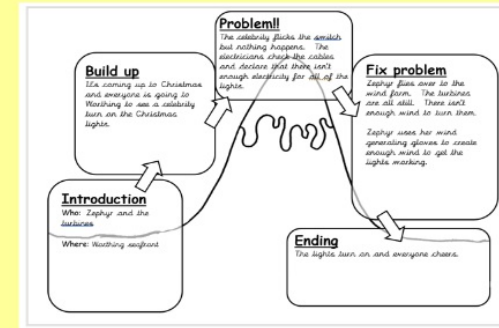

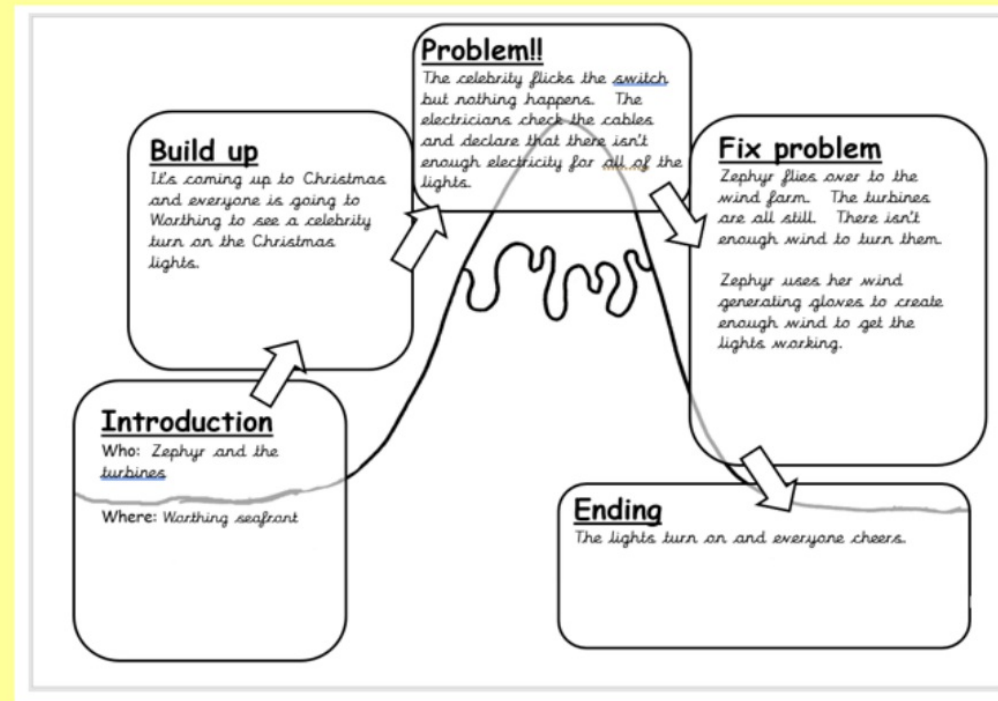
I'm going to need these!
