A rhetorical question is a question which does **not** require an answer.

- *They are used to make or emphasise a point
- *They are used at the end of a piece to conclude
- *You will often see rhetorical questions begin with: Do you really ..? What are you ..? Why not ..? Who can deny ..? Who doesn't ..? How can it ..?
