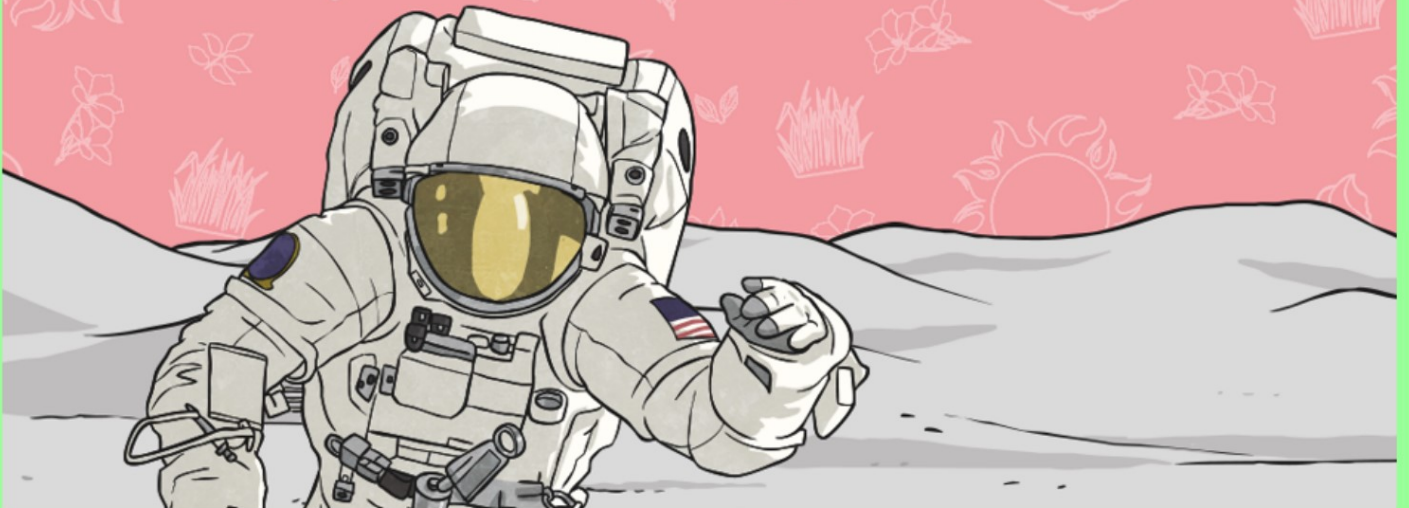
How to use the suffix -ous



What happens to root words when you add the suffix -ous?

Adding the suffix -ous turns a noun into an adjective. It means 'full of'. e.g. danger becomes dangerous meaning full of danger.

Adding the suffix -ous (no change to the root word)
