<p>What is 999? 999 is the emergency services telephone number. When calling this number, you contact the emergency services for urgent assistance.</p> <p>When to call 999? You must only call 999 if there is a real emergency. Call for an ambulance if someone is seriously ill, injured or their life is at risk</p> <p>What is 111? 	<h3>First Aid</h3>	<p>Help given to a sick or injured person. This is given until medical treatment is available.</p>	<p>There is also an app that you can download to a tablet or a smartphone. You can use this to find health advice and much more.</p>
	<h3>A&E</h3>	<p>Accident and Emergency. This is the part of the hospital people go to when they need treatment quickly.</p>
