What after school clubs are available to children in Year 3? Do they all get booked up? How much do they cost? When do they generally finish?	Best Possible Estimate	We typically offer over 40 extra-curricular clubs – some of these are year group specific but many are available to year 3 children. Our clubs are very popular, with booking managed via the My Child At School app. We will confirm sign up arrangements at the start of the autumn term. Booking limits are in place for our more popular clubs to ensure availability for as many children as possible. Whilst selection can vary from term to term, our most recent selection included cookery, sewing, computing, Minecraft, VR and basketball. The costs of clubs varies but prices most recently for Chesswood run clubs have ranged by £1 to £3.50 per week depending on the time of the club. Most after school clubs finish at 4.15pm. Bookings for clubs typically opens up once a term, just before the end of the preceding term, with the exception of autumn term, to enable our new starters to book clubs after joining us.

Consistent Practice	Please note that is not possible to ensure every child is granted all of their friendship choices or ensure where only 1 or 2 choices are granted, that this includes the first name they have listed – however every child joining from Lyndhurst and Springfield has been granted at least one of their friendship choices. The process of building classes, when you wish to get everything right, is highly complex. We seek to place friends first wherever possible, after this, factors such as gender, academic achievement, special educational needs, behaviour & engagement, and wider pastoral factors such as safeguarding and care arrangements all form part of the process and must be balanced. Our intention is to build multiple classes with similar need. Typically, this is a successful process and children are happy and confident once they get to lunchtime on the first day.
		We will support children in establishing positive friendships when they join us in September. Where extra support is needed, we will provide this through our pastoral team – for instance if a child is struggling to make friends, maintain friendships or is part of a friendship that is quite toxic.

With such a large intake our child might get lost and feel in an impersonal school, how do you ensure every child is heard and acknowledged.	Consistent Practice	Pupil voice is vital at Chesswood. Whilst the school as a whole is big, each teacher ensures that all children are heard and acknowledged within their own classroom. Achievements are routinely celebrated both within class and within year groups. We have such a wide range of certificates that it is commonplace for every child to achieve and receive multiple certificates. Our brilliant teachers help to make sure that no child is missed out or ignored. If a child is struggling, talk to the teacher and our team will help to capture their voice and put things right. We also have 2 Junior Governors appointed in each class of the school which help to capture the thoughts of the other children in their class. Consistent Practice	As part of securing effective learning at Chesswood, teachers consistently aim to secure appropriate challenge. When children are struggling, we will scaffold the learning to help them. The nature of this scaffolding can include working with the class teacher, working with a teaching assistant, spending longer on fluency based work, using visual prompts such as a word bank or a multiplication square or using concrete resources such as counters. In some cases, children may require further support in the form of an intervention away from the point of teaching.
