### Perfect Tenses

The 'perfect' tenses are used to talk about actions completed in the present or at a particular point in the past. To write perfect tenses we use have/had, for example:

Present Perfect

I have walked the dog today.

Past Perfect
I had walked the dog for miles.

Perfect tenses

Examples

Present perfect: He has finished his homework.

Past perfect: She had met him before the party.

#### Fronted Adverbials

fronted = at the start of a sentence



adverb/adverbial = gives more information about a verb (or adjective)






