Pronouns are words which replace a noun.

First person pronouns

First person pronouns refer to the speaker or the writer themselves e.g. I, me, my, we, us

Possessive pronouns

These pronouns help to show possession and that we have or own something e.g. mine, his, hers, ours

What is emotive language?

Emotive language are words which are used to create an emotional response. We use emotive language in persuasive writing to conjure emotions in the reader and help convince them of our point of view.
