Imperatives and adverbs

When we tell people what to do, we often use **imperative verbs**.

This is when we use the verb on it's own without a pronoun (he, she, it, you, they....etc). We use 'don't' to make the imperative negative.

<u>Sit up</u> straight and <u>focus</u> on your breathing.

Don't tense your face or jaw and **relax** your shoulders.

We can also add an adverb to give more information about HOW to carry out the action.

Don't press too **hard** on the page or your pen will go through it.

Write your name **carefully** and **neatly** on the front of the test paper.

<u>Challenge:</u> Connect your sentences together into one paragraph using subordinate clauses (ISAWAWABUB), relative clauses, punctuation and parenthesis, fronted adverbials etc
